With majestic sunsets, cliff-top drives boasting spectacular views and our picturesque coastal towns, you are sure to find something to delight.



LEO CUMMINGS MONUMENT LOOKOUT

(Map ref E5, Page 12)

Leo Cummings (pioneering family of Sheringa district) drowned when the crayfish boat 'Wangaree' was wrecked on the rocks at the base of the cliffs near Kiana in 1959, and the monument was erected in his honour.

This site boasts uninterrupted views to Point Drummond in the south and to the rugged cliffs of Sheringa in the north and is home to a family of osprey that nest on a craggy pinnacle adjacent the lookout. There is an access road and car park, with plenty of room for caravans.

DID YOU KNOW?

The area is home to 100,000-year-old fossil cocoons locally known as 'clogs'.

The weevils that create these cocoons (Leptoptius duponti) still inhabit this area.



LAKE HAMILTON EATING HOUSE

(Map ref E5, Page 12)

Built around 1857, the Eating House was used until the 1880s as a stopping place for coaches and travellers on their way to the Far West Coast. The Port Lincoln Caledonian Society restored the property in 1972 to its original condition. Today, it's the ideal rest spot, providing a fascinating glimpse of the region's history.

SHERINGA / ROUND LAKE

(Map ref E5, Page 12)

A popular camping area which is supported by a well-stocked roadhouse, visit Sheringa for its magnificent white sand dunes, rugged cliffs and great salmon fishing and surfing.

LOCKS WELL (Map ref D4, Page 12)

One of the most reliable locations for catching Australian salmon in South Australia, Locks Well beach consistently produces big salmon. Accessible by a safe, 120-metre wooden staircase (283 steps), there are also amenities and a look-out offering panoramic views of the rugged coastline and a great photo opportunity to capture a stunning West Coast sunset.

WATERLOO BAY LOOKOUT

Located just off Flinders Highway, between the town and the jetty. Park at the jetty car park or take the walking trail there. Beautiful views that over-look the whole of Waterloo Bay.

WALKER'S ROCK (Map ref C4, Page 12)

Part of the Lake Newland Conservation Park. Walker's Rock offers you the opportunity to swim, snorkel, surf and fish on one of the longest beaches on the West Coast. Access onto the beach is by 4WD, experienced drivers only. Coastal camping is permitted.

LAKE NEWLAND CONSERVATION PARK

(Map ref C4, Page 12)

A natural saline lake 20 km in length, Lake Newland is the most extensive wetland on Eyre Peninsula, providing an excellent opportunity to observe the waterfowl and wading birds that inhabit the wetlands. The lake section of the park is only accessible by 4WD. A day visit and camping area at Walker's Rock (managed by the local council) provides 2WD access to the coast. COLTON HISTORIC TOWN SITE AND **COLTON CEMETERY** (Map ref C4, page 12)

An old pioneer town, which once comprised a hotel, church, school and cemetery. The cemetery is the burial site of the first Greek settler to South Australia, George Tramountanas (North),

who arrived in SA in 1822 at the age of 20. He loved the land and the sea and brought with him the skills and knowledge of his homeland. His headstone tells his story both in Greek and English. An olive grove lines the walk to the gate in his honour. Fact sheets are available from the Elliston Community and Visitor Information Centre

TALIA CAVES & TALIA BEACH

(Map ref B3, page 12)

Talia Beach offers good beach and rock fishing.

Visit 'The Woolshed', a large cavern carved into the cliff by wave action. A walkway and wooden steps provide access onto the rocks to view the cave with its honeycombed ceiling, dark crevices and nearby blowholes.

Not far away is 'The Tub', a large crater with a tunnel connection to the sea. It is 10 - 30 metres deep and 50 metres across. Beyond 'The Tub' is a dramatic cliff face that offers long views to the south along Talia Beach.

The monument to Sister DB Millard who drowned 24th June 1928 is also located here.

MT CAMEL BEACH (Map ref B3, Page 12)

This pristine beach offers excellent year-round surf fishing for salmon, mullet and large Australian herring (tommy ruff).



VENUS BAY SOUTH HEAD WALKING TRAIL & NEEDLE EYE LOOKOUT

(Map ref B3, Page 12)

Walk the South Head Walking Trail at Venus Bay and see pods of dolphins surfing and frolicking through the waves at the Bay's entrance. Visitors might also spot Australian sea lions and sea eagles, and from May to October this is a great viewing spot for the southern right whales as they migrate to the Great Australian Bight.

The Needle Eye Lookout offers spectacular vistas of natural rock formations, rugged cliffs and breathtaking views of the coastline. Feel the fresh Southern Ocean breeze while standing at lookouts and soak up some of the best views that the Great Australian Bight and Eyre Peninsula have to offer.

VENUS BAY CONSERVATION PARK

(Map ref B3, Page 12)

The park comprises Weyland Peninsula and the seven islands within Venus Bay. There are over 100 species of birds, 12 species of native mammals and 25 reptile species in the park. Visit www.parks.sa.gov.au for more information.

MURPHY'S HAYSTACKS (Map ref A2, Page 12)

An outcrop of unique pink granite boulders, Murphy's Haystacks is a great photo opportunity. It's located 40 km south east of Streaky Bay on the road to Calca and Point Labatt. Visitors can take the walkway between the two groups of rock outcrops and read the interpretive signage. These ancient wind-worn granite inselbergs, huge rocks purported to be over 1500 million years old, occur in numerous places on the Peninsula. Entry is by donation at the gate.

CHAIN OF BAYS (Map ref A1, Page 12)

Sceale Bay, Searcy Bay, Baird Bay, Corvisart Bay. For more information visit www.chainofbays.com.au.

POINT LABATT (Map ref B1, Page 12)

A purpose-built viewing platform 50 metres above the seal colony allows you to closely observe the only permanent colony of Australian sea lions (Neophoca cinera) on the Australian mainland, with the aid of interpretative signage. Binoculars and/or a telephoto lens are recommended for enhanced viewing.



MOUNT WEDGE (Map ref C5, Page 12)

Mount Wedge is made of a very rare form of granite with only one other mountain in the world being of the same formation. Cereal crops and sheep are the mainstay of this area.

MT WEDGE SCHOOL HISTORIC SITE

1914 - 1970 memorial plague on southern side of Birdseye Highway near Mt Wedge.

SYLVIA BIRDSEYE COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUE

(Map ref C6, Page 12, north side of highway) A commemoration stone was laid at the halfway mark (northern side) when the Birdseye Highway was sealed in 2003.

POLDA HISTORIC GOLF COURSE

(Map ref C6, Page 12, north side of highway) Limestone rocks were cleared during early settlement to make way for a golf course.

The cairns of cleared rocks still stand today as a visible reminder of social activities nearly a hundred years ago.



POLDA PUMPING STATION

(Map ref C6, Page 12)

First commissioned in 1962, Polda augments the Tod water supply to much of Eyre Peninsula.

HINCKS AND HAMBIDGE WILDERNESS PROTECTION AREAS AND BASCOMBE WELL CONSERVATION PARK

Comprising over 25,000 ha of mallee country, Hambidge Wilderness Protection Area is home to Prominent Hill (143m high). Hincks Wilderness Protection Area is approximately 66,300 ha. Both parks are accessible from Lock, as is Bascombe Well Conservation Park where you can discover ruins and excellent wildflower displays between August and October.



Situated on the shores of spectacular Waterloo Bay and known for its rugged, scenic coastline and as a great place for fishing, swimming, surfing and bush walking. Set between rolling hills and some of the most spectacular and dramatic coastline on the Eyre Peninsula, the town is now a centre for a cereal-growing, mixed-farming and fishing community.

An RV dump point has been installed near the Information Centre and is maintained by the District Council.

Population: 373 (soars to 1500 during peak season). 1008 in the District Council of Elliston.

HISTORY

Matthew Flinders sailed past Waterloo Bay in 1802, naming the Waldegrave Islands and Anxious Bay. The Bay was later named Waterloo Bay in 1865 on the Golden Jubilee of the Battle of Waterloo, hence the names Wellington Point and Wellesley Point at its entrance.

On land, Edward John Eyre explored the area, naming Lake Newland in 1840. Settlers took up holdings some time around 1847.

Elliston was planned and named by Governor Jervois in 1878, some say after Ellen Liston, a governess for a local pioneering family. However, it is more likely that it was named after Sir Samuel Burdon Ellis, a friend of Governor Jervois, or possibly Sir Henry Walton Ellis, who died of wounds in the Battle of Waterloo.

Elliston became the central port for the region from which the early settlers transported their wool and wheat by sailing vessels and later steamships. Road transport took over after 1965. Since then Elliston has established itself as an important centre for the surrounding area with farming, fishing and tourism providing the main sources of employment and business opportunities.

ATTRACTIONS

ELLISTON COMMUNITY HALL - MURAL

Finished in 1992 and repainted in 2014, the mural was painted by the community under the guidance of artists Siv Grava and John Turpie. Smaller murals on the old shop were also commissioned. The main mural depicts the life of Elliston, taking in both the maritime and rich agricultural heritage.

ELLISTON TRUDINGER PARK PLAYGROUND AND SKATEPARK

Enjoy the shade and facilities which include a barbecue and play equipment.

Named as a tribute to Dr Trudinger who served our community for over 18 years.

FLLISTON JETTY

Heritage listed because of its steel pylons screwed directly into the sea floor using a horsedrawn winch, the 424m jetty is great for a walk or fishing. Dusk is the time to catch a number of fish, including Australian herring (tommy ruff), squid, garfish and trevally. The jetty is lit at night with solar powered lights.

ELLISTON CLIFFTOP DRIVES

Breathtaking scenic views on both loops.

The roads to both sections are part bitumen and part gravel. They are regularly maintained and provide a good surface for conventional vehicles.

- Little Bay Clifftop Drive: From the lookout take in the superb view of the outlying islands, including Top Gallant Isles, Flinders Island, Pearson Island and part of Waldegrave Island. Bird Rock, Waterloo Bay, the Elliston township, the silos and the farmland beyond can also be seen from the lookout.
- Anxious Bay Clifftop Drive: Includes Anxious Bay views as well as the islands and Blacks surf spot. It has the added attraction of sculptures dotted along the cliffs.

ANXIOUS BAY & WALDEGRAVE ISLAND CONSERVATION PARK

King George whiting and crayfish are just some of the catch from this clean and unspoilt bay. Waldegrave Islands Conservation Park is a sanctuary for Cape Barren geese, fairy penguins, sea lions and other wildlife. Anxious Bay is appropriately named - we recommend you seek local advice on boating sizes and conditions before you venture out.


Port Kenny was originally named Kenny's Landing and was used to transfer grain onto the barges for shipping out from Venus Bay. The township was surveyed in 1912 and named after local landholder MSW Kenny.

ATTRACTIONS

Port Kenny is well known for recreational fishing. Whiting, flathead, trevally and garfish are commonly caught. Port Kenny is also close to Baird Bay, Murphy's Haystacks, Point Labatt sea lion colony to the north and Talia Caves and the Venus Bay Conservation Park to the south and west.

Population: 30

Swelling to several hundred in holidays.



Venus Bay is renowned for excellent fishing opportunities and has a beautiful, calm bay that is perfect for family holidays. The Bay is known to hold whiting, salmon, garfish, snook, Australian herring, flathead and gummy shark. It also has some top surfing spots and is a must for diving and snorkelling enthusiasts.

HISTORY

Venus Bay was named by Robert Venn who sailed into the Bay in 1848 in his schooner named Venus.

ATTRACTIONS

VENUS BAY JETTY


The uniquely curved jetty is home to the West Coast prawn trawlers and boasts good fishing all year round. It is lit at night for the keen anglers.

South Head Walking Trail & Needle Eye Lookout (See Venus Bay map for details.)

VENUS BAY CONSERVATION PARK

Covers the peninsula and the islands within Venus Bay. Huge variety of birds, mammals and reptiles. (See District Map on page 12 for details.)







Sheringa, situated on the Flinders Highway 40 km south of Elliston, is a small township surrounded by pastoral properties. It was established in 1876 and was formerly home to a boarding house and changing station for horses, then to the telephone exchange and post office for the local community. Sheringa Beach offers a camping area and campsite toilets, some 4x4 only.

DID YOU KNOW?

Bramfield was the original township of the Elliston District. Cobb and Co stopped here on their way to Colton from Port Lincoln.

The area is known for its two orchards producing organically grown fruit and nuts which are available for sale locally. Driving west, watch for the first glimpse of shining Waterloo Bay and the islands beyond - a truly wonderful sight!

BRAMFIELD CEMETERY

This is the burial place of many early settlers, as Bramfield was regarded as the local town in the days before Elliston grew to take its place. Look for the grave of Mr William Griffiths Tree who was a local land owner and a shearer. Mr Tree had his headstone made by Tilletts Memorials in Adelaide at least two years before his death at Elliston on 21st July 1959. Except for the date of his death. Mr Tree arranged for some of his history to be engraved on it, returning to Tilletts on at least ten occasions to update the information. His shearing tallies were all achieved with the art of the blade shears.





Population: 276

Lock lies in the geographic centre of the Eyre Peninsula and is part of the District Council of Elliston. The striking silos that form Lock's grain storage facilities make Lock a strategic delivery centre for the grain grown in the region. Lock is also a service centre for the families on cereal and grazing properties in the surrounding area, with school buses bringing in children from properties to the local area school. Murals on various buildings in the town depict life in this area.

Near the silos is the beautiful Kukathu Dam which was built to harvest the stormwater from the sealed areas of the town. A small picnic area provides a comfortable place for bird watching. This dam, as well as the dam built at the south end of the town, provides water for the oval, Community Park and Bowling Green.

An RV dump point located at the Caravan Park for your convenience is maintained by the Lions Club.

HISTORY

Settled in the late 1860s, the area originally known as Terre Siding, was renamed Lock in 1918 after a member of the SA Survey Team, Corporal Albert Lock, who was killed in Belgium during WWI.

The town was proclaimed in February 1914.

A mural honouring Albert Lock is now located in the town.

Known as 'The Oakbank of the West', the Lock Races are held on the picturesque McLachlan Park Race Course, 10 km north west of the Lock township. Shady trees and shelter provide a perfect location for a fun family day out. Great course facilities, full bar and canteen, fashions of the field, TAB, bookmakers, sky channel and internet access are available on course. See the Calendar of Events. ATTRACTIONS

LOCAL CONSERVATION PARKS

Surrounding the Lock district are four conservation parks boasting beautiful wildflowers, native animals, bird watching and mallee fowls. These parks are Bascombe Well Conservation Park, Hambidge Conservation Park, Hinks Conservation Park and Barwell Conservation Park, all of which have no facilities for camping or water, but are available for visiting. Fair weather 4WD tracks only.



LOCK COMMUNITY PARK

This park provides good BBQ facilities, shelter and seating, with the area being further developed for the centenary celebrations of the Lock township in 2014. You will also find a large monument depicting the development of farming in the area.

FEDERATION PARK

Native Bush garden planted at the centenary of Federation in 2001.



LOCK HERITAGE MUSEUM

WALKER'S ROCK (13 km north of Elliston) SHERINGA (40 km south of Elliston)

Any style camper is permitted to stay at Walker's Rock and/or Sheringa. \$10 per night per vehicle, paid in the honesty box on site. Envelopes and payments via EFTPOS are also available at the District Council office and Community & Visitor Information Centre located in the Elliston township.

RV CAMPING GROUND

(Elliston Golf Club located in the Elliston township)

Must be a self-contained vehicle with a 4-night maximum stay. Vouchers available in the honesty box on site or at the Community & Visitor Information Centre.

ELLISTON COASTAL TRAIL

EASY - GRADE 2 13.6 km long Allow 6 hours return from start.

Flat compacted rubble path or shared roadway. Clearly sign-posted. No experience required. Incline at lookout.

CLIFFTOP TRAIL

EASY - GRADE 2 6.5 km long Allow 3 hours return from start.

Flat compacted rubble path or shared roadway. Clearly sign-posted.

LITTLE BAY TRAIL -

EASY - GRADE 2 2.4 km long Allow 1 hour return from start.

Flat compacted rubble path. Clearly sign-posted.

BEACH LOOP

MODERATE - GRADE 4 5.7 km long Allow 1.5 hours return from start.

Flat compacted rubble path or on-beach walking. Beach subject to tides. Inclines at beach entry/exit points.
