

#### **AS WET AS A SHAG?**

The Elliston Branch of the SACWA Inc. start the new year bird series with a common species many will recognise. However their adaptations are quite unique.

Cormorants (or shags) can be confusing to identify. Four have an extensive range over much of the continent and their ranges overlap on the mainland. Three of the five are black and white and two of the five are black, and if you throw the Australasian Darter into the mix (a bird sometimes confused with a cormorant), it is black and white for the female and black for the male. The most common species are the pied cormorant, residents of this coastline, and commonly seen on the rocky outcrop at Anxious Bay and the Esplanade.

The Australian Pied Cormorant is predominantly black on its back and upper surface of the wings and white on the underside. It has a small yellow patch between the bill and the eye on each side of the head. It stands between 65-85 cm tall, with a wingspan of 110-130 cm. It has a long, substantial bill that is described as "horn" coloured or "off white". Their hooked beaks have a sharp nail like tip that can grip slippery fish. It is an expert fisherman and primarily feeds on benthic (bottom dwelling) fish, crustaceans, molluscs, and cephalopods. The bird captures its prey by diving and swimming underwater, using its large webbed feet for propulsion. It has special muscles in their feet which enables them to spread their toes wide underwater, turning them into powerful flippers. Its agile movements underwater enable it to snatch fish with precision and efficiency.

After a successful fishing session, it can often be observed perched on a branch or rock with its wings outstretched. This behaviour serves an important purpose – the cormorant's feathers are not waterproof, as this helps them hunt more effectively by reducing buoyancy. So by holding its wings open, it allows them to dry effectively. The wing drying pose doubles as a method of digesting large meals- the sun warming position helps increase their body temperature to aid digestion.

It is equally comfortable feeding in shallow, still water as well as in rapidly moving currents. It capitalizes on both environments depending on the availability of prey. Whether hunting individually or in larger groups, the pied cormorant exhibits impressive diving skills and foraging techniques, particularly when schools of small fish are abundant.

Seabirds that dive underwater have particularly dense feathers, which also helps water from penetrating through the feathers to the bird's body.

Unlike most diving birds, cormorants swim using only their feet, keeping the wings tucked tight against the body. Bird feathers aren't naturally waterproof but birds can make them water resistant by applying waxes from their preen glands. Birds need to groom its feathers: they will alternately rub its head against the base of its tail, and against its other feathers. It is depositing waxy, water-resistant oils found in the preen gland (at the tail base) onto the other feathers.

Birds also have a dusty powder in their feathers. This powder comes from special feathers called "powderdowns", which are constantly disintegrating into waterproof powder. This powder adds water-resistant quality of feathers. It is essential for birds like ducks and swans to constantly preen their feathers to keep them in good shape, and to keep distributing these waterproof oils and powders.

Underwater acrobats; Cormorants can dive to depths of up to 45m, and can achieve speeds of 4.3m/sec, making them one of the most agile aquatic hunters.

Their bones are denser than most birds, helping them stay submerged while hunting. They can slow their heart rate from 220 beats per minute to just 20 bpm during deep dives, conserving oxygen. Some species work together in groups to herd fish into shallow waters, displaying cooperative hunting skills.

On the 25th of June 2024, Louella Weetra was born at WCH with a cleft pallet, small airways, and moderate hearing loss, as her ears have not fully developed due to a condition known as Treacher Collins Syndrome.

At 2 weeks old, Louella needed a tracheostomy to assist with breathing difficulties caused by her small airways. It is unknown how long she will require the tracheostomy.

Louella spent her first 3 months in hospital and is now a happy, thriving 5-month-old, with a long journey ahead of her. She requires night nurses, as she needs to be monitored 24/7 due to her tracheostomy care. Her family are relocating to Adelaide for 12+ months to access essential services for her ongoing medical needs.

If you would like to contribute financially towards the purchase of a portable suction machine and oximeter, the unexpected relocation costs of setting up a home in Adelaide, and Louella's ongoing medical appointments and future medical procedures

Treacher Collins Syndrome is a rare condition that affects the development of bones and other tissues of the face. The signs and symptoms of this syndrome vary greatly, ranging from almost unnoticeable to severe. Most affected individuals have underdeveloped facial bones, particularly the cheek bones, and a very small jaw and chin. This condition is also characterised by absent, small, or unusually formed ears and half have hearing loss. This condition affects an estimated 1 in 50,000 people.


